Prayer:- This Habeas Corpus Petition is filed under Article 226 of the Constitution of India call for the entire records leading to the detention of the petitioner's husband, Arsan Ali, Son of Ragath Ali, Male, 26 years, who has been detained under Act 14/82 as a "Goonda" vide detention order dated 22.09.2014 on the file of the 2nd respondent herein made in Memo No.1322/BDFGISSV/2014, quash the same and consequently direct the respondents herein to produce the body and person of the said detenu before this Hon'ble Court and set him at liberty.

ORDER

This Habeas Corpus Petition is filed, by the wife of the detenu, namely, Arsan Ali, Son of Ragath Ali, Male, 26 years , to issue a Writ of Habeas Corpus, to call for the records, in Memo No.1322/BDFGISSV/2014 dated 22.09.2014, passed by the 2nd Respondent, detaining the detenu, under Section 3(1) of the Tamil

Nadu Prevention of Dangerous Activities of Bootleggers, Drug Offenders, Forest Offenders, Goondas, Immoral Traffic Offenders, Sand Offenders, Slum Grabbers and Video Pirates Act, 1982 (Tamil Nadu Act 14/1982) the Tamil Nadu Act 14 of 1982, branding him as a "Goonda", in the Central Prison, Puzhal, Chennai, and to quash the same and to direct the Respondents to produce the body of the detenu and set him at liberty forthwith.

2. Though several grounds have been raised in this Habeas Corpus Petition, Mr.M.Rajavelu, the learned counsel for the petitioner has assailed the impugned detention order only on the ground of non-supply of copy of the bail applications, F.I.R., Charge sheet and other relevant particulars in similar cases, referred to in the grounds of detention, for arriving at the subjective satisfaction that there is likelihood of the detenu coming out on bail, which has affected the constitutional right of making an effective and purposeful representation to the authorities concerned, thereby vitiating the detention.

3. Per contra, Mr.C.Emalias, the learned Additional Public Prosecutor would submit that the impugned detention order has been passed on cogent and sufficient materials and there is no illegality or infirmity in the impugned order of detention. However, he admitted that except bail orders in similar cases, the copy of the bail applications and other particulars in similar cases, referred to in the grounds of detention, were not supplied to the detenu.

4. We have given our careful and anxious consideration to the rival submissions put forward by the learned counsel on either side and thoroughly scanned through the impugned detention order and the entire materials available on record.

5. It is seen from paragraph No.4 of the Grounds of Detention that in similar cases, the accused were released on bail by the XVII Metropolitan Magistrate, in CrI.M.P.No.593/2009 in respect of Crime No.26/2009 on the file of R1, Mambalam Police Station, registered under sections 379 IPC and by the Court of Principal Sessions Judge, Chennai, in CrI.M.P.No.929/2013 in respect of Crime No.160/2013 on the file of V-5, Thirumangamam Police Station registered under Sections 341, 294(b) 336, 427, 397 and 506(ii) IPC. On a perusal of the Paper Book furnished by the Prosecution, it is seen that except the bail orders in similar cases, no other particulars like bail applications, F.I.R., charge sheet etc. in similar cases were furnished to the detenu. The bail applications, F.I.R., Charge sheet etc. filed in similar cases were the documents relied upon by the Detaining Authority to come to a subjective satisfaction that the detenu was likely to be released on bail. Admittedly, the said documents have not been supplied to the detenu, as it did not form part of the Paper Book

furnished by the Prosecution. Therefore, the non-supply of the copy of the bail applications and other relevant particulars in similar cases to the detenu would vitiate the impugned detention order.

6. The Honourable Supreme Court in *M.Ahamed Kutty Vs. Union of India* and another (1990-2-SCC-1) has observed thus:-

"7. Considering the facts in the instant case, the bail application and the bail order were vital materials for consideration. If those were not considered the satisfaction of the detaining authority itself would have been impaired and if those had been considered, they would be documents relied on by the detaining authority though not specifically mentioned in the annexure to the order of detention and those ought to have formed part of the documents supplied to the detenu with the grounds of detention and without them the grounds themselves could not be said to have been complete. We have, therefore, no alternative but to hold that it amounted to denial of the detenu's right to make an effective representation and that it resulted in violation of Article 22(5) of the Constitution of India rendering the continued detention of the detenu illegal and entitling the detenu to be set at liberty in this case." (Emphasis added)."

7. This Court in *Jarinabegam Vs. State of Tamil Nadu* by Secretary to Government, Prohibition and Exercise Department, Chennai and another (2007-1-MLJ-Crl-18) relying upon the decision of the Honourable Supreme Court cited supra has held that non supply of the copy of the bail application in similar case to the detenu has the effect of vitiating the order of detention.

8. As already analysed by us, in the facts and circumstances of the present case, non-supply of the copy of the bail applications and other relevant particulars in similar cases, to the detenu has the effect of vitiating the impugned detention order. Further, due to non-supply of such a vital document, the detenu has lost valuable right to make an effective representation to the authorities concerned.

9. In the light of the above said principles laid down by the Honourable Supreme Court and for the reasons stated above, the impugned order of detention is vitiated and the same is liable to be quashed.

10. In the result, this Habeas Corpus Petition is allowed. The impugned detention order is set aside. The detenu is directed

to be released forthwith, unless his presence is required in connection with any other case.
