Prayer:- Habeas Corpus Petition is filed under Article 226 of the Constitution of India to issue a Writ of Habeas Corpus praying to call for records of the first respondent in detention order in No.75/BCDFGISSSV/2014, dated 27.11.2014 (TPDA.5412) setting aside the order of detention passed by the first respondent herein setting the detenu by name Ramesh @ Ayya Ramesh, aged about 41 years, Son of Vadivel at liberty now detained in Central Prison, Madurai and pass such further or other orders.

ORDER

(Order of the Court was made by A.SELVAM, J)

This Habeas Corpus Petition has been filed under Article 226 of the Constitution of India praying to call for records relating to detention order passed in No.75/BCDFGISSSV/2014, dated 27.11.2014 (TPDA.5412) by the detaining authority, who has been arrayed as first respondent herein against the detenu by name Ramesh @ Ayya Ramesh, Son of Vadivel and quash the same and thereby set him at liberty forthwith.

2. The Inspector of Police, D1 Tallakulam Police Station as sponsoring authority has submitted an affidavit to the detaining authority, wherein it is stated that the detenu has involved in the following adverse case:

Crime No.938 of 2014 D1 Tallakulam Police Station registered under Sections 147, 148, 294(b) and 506(ii) of the Indian Penal Code.

3. Further it is stated in the affidavit that one Chandran as complainant has lodged a complaint to the Inspector of Police, D1 Tallakulam Police Station against the detenu and the same has been registered as Crime No.943 of 2014 under Sections 147, 148, 307 and 302 of the Indian Penal Code and ultimately requested the detaining authority to invoke Act 14 of 1982 against the detenu.



4. The detaining authority, after considering the averments made in the affidavit and other connected documents, has derived subjective satisfaction to the effect that the detenu is a habitual offender and ultimately branded him as 'Goonda' by way of passing the impugned detention order and in order to quash the same, the present Habeas Corpus Petition has been filed by the wife of the detenu as petitioner.

5. On the side of the respondents a detailed counter has been filed, wherein it has been contended to the effect that all the averments made in the petition are false and ultimately prayed to dismiss the same.

6. The learned counsel appearing for the petitioner has contended that on the side of the detenu six representations have been submitted and the same are not disposed of without delay and therefore the detention order in question is liable to be quashed.

7. The learned Additional Public Prosecutor has contended that the representations submitted on the side of the detenu are duly considered and disposed of without delay and therefore the detention order in question does not call for any interference.

8. On the side of the respondents, a proforma has been submitted wherein it has been clearly stated that with regard to first representation in between Column Nos.7 to 9, five clear working days are available and in between Column Nos.12 and 13, six clear working days are available. With regard to second representation in between Column Nos.7 to 9, five clear working days are available and in between Column Nos.12 and 13, six clear working days are available. With regard to third representation in between Column Nos.12 and 13, six clear working days are available. With regard to fourth representation in between Column Nos.12 and 13, six clear working days are available. With regard to fifth representation in between Column Nos.8 and 9, two clear working days are available and with regard to sixth representation in between Column Nos.3 to 5, one clear working day is available and in between Column Nos.8 and 9, four clear working days are available and no explanation has been given on the side of the respondents with regard to huge delay in disposing of the representations submitted on the side of the detenu and that itself would affect the rights of the detenu guaranteed under Article 22(5) of the Constitution of India and therefore the detention order in question is liable to be quashed.

9. In fine, this Habeas Corpus Petition is allowed and the detention order passed in No.75/BCDFGISSSV/2014, dated 27.11.2014 (TPDA.5412) by the first respondent/detaining authority is quashed and consequently the respondents are directed to set the detenu viz., Ramesh @ Ayya Ramesh, Son of Vadivel at liberty forthwith, unless he is required to be incarcerated in connection with any other case.
