Report dated 17.08.2015 of learned Judicial Magistrate 1st

Class, Patti has been received whereby after recording statements of complainant Naseeb Kaur and injured Kashmir Kaur as well as the accused persons namely Sanak Singh, Narinder Kaur @ Narinderjit Kaur, Gurvinder Singh and Palwinder Singh @ Pindu, the Court has shown its satisfaction that the compromise has been arrived at

voluntarily, out of free will of the parties, without any undue influence, coercion or pressure.

Heard.

In the light of the satisfaction shown by the Court, being a case of version and cross-version, the fact that parties belong to the same very village and the offences for which the accused have been hauled up are not of heinous nature, together with the fact that compromise will go a long way in ironing out differences for betterment of future life of the parties and in view of the law laid down in '**Gian Singh v. State of Punjab and another**' 2012(4) RCR (Criminal) 543 and '**Kulwinder Singh and others v. State of Punjab and another**' 2007 (3) RCR (Criminal) 1052, the prayer made in the petition is allowed, proceedings by way of FIR No.54 dated 04.06.2013 registered at Police Station Harike, District Tarn Taran under Sections 323/325/326/34 IPC and all consequences arising out of the said FIR qua the present petitioners are quashed.

The petition stands allowed in those terms.
