W.P.(Crl.) 528/2017

The petitioners have sought quashing of the FIR No.362/2015 dated 08.04.2015 (PS Madhu Vihar) instituted for the offences under sections 498A/406/34 of the IPC.

Respondent no.2 was married to one Sanjay who is the son of petitioner nos.1 & 2. It has been submitted that the aforesaid Sanjay has gone missing since 2014 and for which the respondent no.2 has also lodged a complaint. However, as of today, there is no trace of Sanjay.

Petitioner nos.1 & 2 are the parents-in-law of respondent no.2 whereas petitioner nos.3, 4 & 5 are the brother-in-laws (brothers of the

husband of respondent no.2). It has been submitted on behalf of the petitioners that the marriage between respondent no.2 and Sanjay took place on 24.01.2013. Because of the irresponsible behaviour of the husband of respondent no.2, he was disowned by petitioner nos.1 & 2. Respondent no.2 along with her husband thereafter shifted to the parental house of respondent no.2. The petitioners have stated that thereafter they have no information either about Sanjay or respondent no.2.

It has then been submitted that a petition was filed under the Domestic Violence Act before the Karkardooma Courts, Delhi by the respondent no.2 which now stands dismissed for non-prosecution. In the year 2015, the subject FIR was lodged against Sanjay and the petitioners. During the investigation of the present case, whatever articles belonging to respondent no.2 were lying with the petitioners, were returned to her, to her satisfaction. As stated earlier, the respondent no.2 did not press the petition filed under the Domestic Violence Act. Respondent no.2, on realising that the petitioners are not to be faulted for her failed marriage, entered into an agreement with them with a conscious decision not to prosecute the petitioners any further in the present FIR.

The petitioners, on their part, have agreed to pay a sum of Rs.85,000/- to the respondent no.2 towards all her claims as against the petitioners. The bonafides of the petitioners is further evident from the fact that a gold ring belonging to respondent no.2 which was lying with them has also been returned to her in the Court today.

The draft of Rs.85,000/- vide DD No.530749 dated 20.05.2017 drawn on ICICI Bank, Connaught Place, New Delhi, in favour of respondent no.2 has been given to respondent no.2 in the Court which has been accepted by

her on satisfaction.

Ms. Kamna Vohra, ASC submits that the whereabouts of the husband of respondent no.2 is not yet known.

The present petition has been filed for quashing of the FIR qua the petitioners only.

Taking into account the fact that the husband of the respondent no.2 is missing since 2014 and that the petitioners, without their fault have been facing prosecution since the lodging of the FIR, this Court is persuaded to quash the present FIR qua the petitioners. While saying so, this Court has taken into account the fact that the husband of respondent no.2 was disowned by petitioner nos.1 & 2 way back in the year 2014. The petitioners now cannot be faulted with the failed marriage of respondent no.2.

The petitioners have been identified by his counsel. Ms. Kamna Vohra has also made respondent no.2 understand that the case is being quashed on her consent.

Taking into account the aforesaid facts and the settlement arrived at between the petitioners and respondent No.2, this Court is persuaded to quash the subject FIR.

In ***Gian Singh vs. State of Punjab & Another, (2012) 10 SCC 303***, the Supreme Court has held that cases which are not compoundable under Section 320 of the Cr.P.C. could also be quashed, when continuation of any criminal proceeding would be an exercise in futility and where justice demands that the dispute between the parties should be put to an end and peace is restored. But ending of such criminal proceedings could only be ordered for securing the ends of justice.

The Supreme Court has further observed in *Gian Singh vs. State of*

Punjab & Another (Supra):

“58..... No doubt, crimes are acts which have harmful effect on the public and consist in wrongdoing that seriously endangers and threatens the well-being of the society and it is not safe to leave the crime-doer only because he and the victim have settled the dispute amicably or that the victim has been paid compensation, yet certain crimes have been made compoundable in law, with or without the permission of the court. In respect of serious offences like murder, rape, dacoity, etc., or other offences of mental depravity under IPC or offences of moral turpitude under special statutes, like the Prevention of Corruption Act or the offences committed by public servants while working in that capacity, the settlement between the offender and the victim can have no legal sanction at all. However, certain offences which overwhelmingly and predominantly bear civil flavour having arisen out of civil, mercantile, commercial, financial, partnership or such like transactions or the offences arising out of matrimony, particularly relating to dowry, etc. or the family dispute, where the wrong is basically to the victim and the offender and the victim have settled all disputes between them amicably, irrespective of the fact that such offences have not been made compoundable, the High Court may within the framework of its inherent power, quash the criminal proceeding or criminal complaint or FIR if it is satisfied that on the face of such settlement, there is hardly any likelihood of the offender being convicted and by not quashing the criminal proceedings, justice shall be casualty and ends of justice shall be defeated. The above list is illustrative and not exhaustive. Each case will depend on its own facts and no hard-and-fast category can be prescribed.”

466. The pertinent observations of the Apex Court are as under:-

29. In view of the aforesaid discussion, we sum up and lay down the following principles by which the High Court would be guided in giving adequate treatment to the settlement between the parties and exercising its power under Section 482 of the Code while accepting the settlement and quashing the proceedings or refusing to accept the settlement with direction to continue with the criminal proceedings:

29.1 Power conferred under Section 482 of the Code is to be distinguished from the power which lies in the Court to compound the offences under Section 320 of the Code. No doubt, under Section 482 of the Code, the High Court has inherent power to quash the criminal proceedings even in those cases which are not compoundable, where the parties have settled the matter between themselves. However, this power is to be exercised sparingly and with caution.

29.2. When the parties have reached the settlement and on that basis petition for quashing the criminal proceedings is filed, the guiding factor in such cases would be to secure:

(i) ends of justice, or

(ii) to prevent abuse of the process of any court.

While exercising the power the High Court is to form an opinion on either of the aforesaid two objectives.

29.3. Such a power is not to be exercised in those prosecutions which involve heinous and serious offences of mental depravity or offences like murder, rape, dacoity, etc. Such offences are not private in nature and have a serious impact on society. Similarly, for the offences alleged to have been committed under special statute like the Prevention of Corruption Act or the offences committed by public servants while working in that capacity are not to be quashed merely on the basis of compromise between the victim and the offender.

29.4. On the other hand, those criminal cases having overwhelmingly and predominantly civil character,

particularly those arising out of commercial transactions or arising out of matrimonial relationship or family disputes should be quashed when the parties have resolved their entire disputes among themselves.

29.5. While exercising its powers, the High Court is to examine as to whether the possibility of conviction is remote and bleak and continuation of criminal cases would put the accused to great oppression and prejudice and extreme injustice would be caused to him by not quashing the criminal cases.

29.6. Offences under Section 307 IPC would fall in the category of heinous and serious offences and therefore are to be generally treated as crime against the society and not against the individual alone. However, the High Court would not rest its decision merely because there is a mention of Section 307 IPC in the FIR or the charge is framed under this provision. It would be open to the High Court to examine as to whether incorporation of Section 307 IPC is there for the sake of it or the prosecution has collected sufficient evidence, which if proved, would lead to proving the charge under Section 307 IPC. For this purpose, it would be open to the High Court to go by the nature of injury sustained, whether such injury is inflicted on the vital/delegate parts of the body, nature of weapons used, etc. Medical report in respect of injuries suffered by the victim can generally be the guiding factor. On the basis of this prima facie analysis, the High Court can examine as to whether there is a strong possibility of conviction or the chances of conviction are remote and bleak. In the former case it can refuse to accept the settlement and quash the criminal proceedings whereas in the latter case it would be permissible for the High Court to accept the plea compounding the offence based on complete settlement between the parties. At this stage, the Court can also be swayed by the fact that the settlement between the parties is going to result in harmony between them which may improve their future relationship.

29.7. While deciding whether to exercise its power under Section 482 of the Code or not, timings of settlement play a crucial role. Those cases where the settlement is arrived at immediately after the alleged commission of offence and the matter is still under investigation, the High Court may be liberal in accepting the settlement to quash the criminal proceedings/investigation. It is because of the reason that at this stage the investigation is still on and even the charge-sheet has not been filed. Likewise, those cases where the charge is framed but the evidence is yet to start or the evidence is still at infancy stage, the High Court can show benevolence in exercising its powers favourably, but after prima facie assessment of the circumstances/material mentioned above. On the other hand, where the prosecution evidence is almost complete or after the conclusion of the evidence the matter is at the stage of argument, normally the High Court should refrain from exercising its power under Section 482 of the Code, as in such cases the trial court would be in a position to decide the case finally on merits and to come to a conclusion as to whether the offence under Section 307 IPC is committed or not. Similarly, in those cases where the conviction is already recorded by the trial court and the matter is at the appellate stage before the High Court, mere compromise between the parties would not be a ground to accept the same resulting in acquittal of the offender who has already been convicted by the trial court. Here charge is proved under Section 307 IPC and conviction is already recorded of a heinous crime and, therefore, there is no question of sparing a convict found guilty of such a crime.”

In the case of ***Jitendra Raghuvanshi & Ors. Vs. Babita Raghuvanshi & Anr. (2013) 4 SCC 58***, wherein the Supreme Court in respect of the matrimonial disputes has specifically held as follows:-

“15. In our view, it is the duty of the courts to encourage genuine settlements of matrimonial disputes, particularly, when the same are on considerable increase. Even if the

offences are non-compoundable, if they relate to matrimonial disputes and the Court is satisfied that the parties have settled the same amicably and without any pressure, we hold that for the purpose of securing ends of justice, Section 320 of the Code would not be a bar to the exercise of power of quashing of FIR, complaint or the subsequent criminal proceedings.

16. There has been an outburst of matrimonial disputes in recent times. The institution of marriage occupies an important place and it has an important role to play in the society. Therefore, every effort should be made in the interest of the individuals in order to enable them to settle down in life and live peacefully. If the parties ponder over their defaults and terminate their disputes amicably by mutual agreement instead of fighting it out in a court of law, in order to do complete justice in the matrimonial matters, the courts should be less hesitant in exercising their extraordinary jurisdiction. It is trite to state that the power under Section 482 should be exercised sparingly and with circumspection only when the Court is convinced, on the basis of material on record, that allowing the proceedings to continue would be an abuse of process of court or that the ends of justice require that the proceedings ought to be quashed....”

Thus, the inherent powers of the High Court, having a wide plenitude could be used for quashing the FIR for securing the ends of justice and to prevent the abuse of the process of the court.

For the reasons afore recorded, the FIR No.362/2015 dated 08.04.2015 (PS Madhu Vihar) instituted for the offences under sections 498A/406/34 of the IPC and all the proceedings emanating therefrom are quashed.

Thus, the petition is disposed of in above mentioned terms.
