The appellant has filed the present appeal against the impugned judgment of conviction and order of sentence dated 12.10.2004 and 13.10.2004, respectively, passed by learned Special Judge, Gurdaspur, vide which, he has been convicted and sentenced to undergo rigorous imprisonment for a period of two years, under Section 20 of the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Act, 1985 (*for short 'NDPS Act'*), along with fine of ₹ 2500/- with a default clause to further undergo rigorous imprisonment of one month.

Brief facts of the case are that prosecution in this case was initiated on the basis of Ruqa (Ex.PD), sent by the then SHO/Inspector Kuljeet Singh (PW-5). The allegations are that on 15.04.2001 at about 06:30 P.M., a Naka was laid at the turning of Kot Matti by Inspector Kuljit Singh, SHO, P.S, Shahpur Kandi along with other police officials. The appellant was apprehended at turning of Kot Matti along with contraband i.e. 520 gms. Charas, wrapped in glazed paper, in the presence of ASI Satish Chander (PW-3), H.C. Bishan Dass and Pawan Kumar. Formal FIR No.16 dated 15.04.2001, under Section 20 of the NDPS Act was registered

at Police Station Shahpur Kandi, District Gurdaspur and after completion of investigation by the police, report under Section 173 Cr.P.C. was submitted before the Special Judge.

Learned trial Court framed the charges under Section 20 of the NDPS Act against the appellant, to which, he pleaded not guilty and claimed trial. Prosecution examined five witnesses and also placed on record the documentary evidence. The entire incriminating material was put to the appellant under Section 313 Cr.P.C., but he claimed innocence and stated that he has been falsely implicated in the present case. In defence, he examined six witnesses.

Learned trial Court, after considering the entire material available on record and hearing both sides, found the appellant guilty of the charges and sentenced under Section 20 of the NDPS Act for illegal possession of non-commercial contraband. Hence, the present appeal.

At the outset, learned Counsel for the appellant does not want to challenge the conviction and confined his prayer only for the quantum of sentence.

It is contended that the appellant is facing criminal proceedings since 2001 and recovery is non-commercial. Out of total two years, he has already undergone actual sentence of five months and during this period, the appellant has not committed any offence including under the NDPS Act. It is further contended that the appellant is sole bread earner and married person. Also contended that he was released on bail by this Court on 07.12.2004 and never misused the concession of same. Now sending him again to the prison in the company of criminals is not justified at this stage.

On the other hand, learned State Counsel opposed the submissions made by learned Counsel for the appellant and prayed for dismissal of appeal.

Heard learned Counsel for both sides and perused the record.

The point for consideration in the present appeal is as to what should be the quantum of sentence, which may be imposed upon the appellant in view of the facts and circumstances of the present case in which, he was convicted under Section 20 of the NDPS Act?

Custody Certificate of the applicant/appellant has been produced. The same is taken on record and perusal of the same reveals that the appellant has already undergone the actual sentence of five months and he is not involved in any other criminal case.

There is no doubt that offender is to be sentenced in commensurate to the offence(s) punishable, committed by him, but that is subject to the facts and circumstances of each case until and unless there is a statutory embargo for imposition of minimum sentence.

The appellant has been convicted under Section 20 of the NDPS Act and recovery of the contraband in the present case is non-commercial quantity.

There is no interdict for this Court to impose the minimum sentence on the appellant for the recovery in question, but at the same time, the provisions of the Act are very stringent, therefore, a balanced approach is to be maintained while imposing sentence in such type of case(s). Undisputedly, the prosecution against the appellant was initiated in the year 2001 and he has already undergone five months' custody and is a married person, maintaining his family being the sole bread earner. The Custody Certificate reveals that he is not involved in any other case except the present one. Therefore, there is a

strong presumption in favour of the appellant that he has tried to reform himself and returned to the main stream of the Society as a law abiding citizen. The Courts are supposed to take into consideration the facts and circumstances of each case regarding the antecedents of the accused/convict while imposing the sentence and if this parameter is to be applied, then the same goes to in favour of the appellant. Even otherwise, at this stage, sending the appellant to undergo remaining part of the sentence in the company of criminals in the prison would be a counter productive instead of serving any purpose for betterment of the individual or the Society.

Keeping in view the facts and circumstances, discussed hereinabove, this Court is of the opinion that end of justice would be met in case the sentence, imposed upon the appellant, is reduced to the period, already undergone by him.

As a result thereof, the appeal is partly allowed and conviction of the appellant under Section 20 of the NDPS Act, imposed by learned trial Court is upheld and his sentence is reduced to the period, already undergone by him. However, the fine and default clause thereof shall remain intact. The appellant is directed to pay the fine, if not paid within one month from receiving the certified copy of this order, otherwise learned trial Court is directed to take necessary action in accordance with law.
