RAJ SHEKHAR ATTRI, J.(Oral)

By invoking Section 482 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, the petitioners have prayed for quashing of FIR No.90 dated 19.12.2017, registered under Sections 420 and 506 of the Indian Penal Code (for short 'IPC') at Police Station Ghuman, Kalan, District Gurdaspur and subsequent proceedings arising therefrom on the basis of compromise and affidavit dated 24.04.2018 (Annexures P-2 and P-3).

In the present case, the FIR was registered on the statement of Mukhtiar Singh son of Surjit Singh. Now, dispute between the parties has been resolved.

Vide orders dated 01.05.2018, 24.07.2018 and 10.10.2018, the parties were directed to appear before the learned trial court/Illaq Magistrate to get their statements recorded with regard to genuineness of compromise.

Pursuant thereto, a report has been submitted by the learned Judicial Magistrate Ist Class, Gurdaspur wherein it has been reported that

statements of the parties have been recorded and compromise entered between

the parties is genuine, without any pressure, coercion, undue influence and with their free consent.

Learned State counsel as well as learned counsel for respondent No.2 have not disputed that the parties i.e. petitioners, respondent No.2 (complainant), have arrived at a settlement with an intent to give burial to their differences.

Perusal of allegations in the FIR reveals that the present case squarely falls in the category of cases that can be quashed by the High Court, in exercise of its inherent power under Section 482 Cr.P.C. Keeping in view authoritative enunciation of law laid down by Hon'ble the Supreme Court in 'Gian Singh v. State of Punjab and another', 2012 (4) R.C.R. (Criminal) 543 and in the light of facts and circumstances discussed hereinbefore, this Court is of the considered opinion that continuation of criminal proceedings would amount to abuse of process of law and it is expedient in the interest of justice that the same are put to an end.

For the foregoing reasons, the petition is allowed and FIR No.90 dated 19.12.2017, registered under Sections 420 and 506 IPC at Police Station Ghuman, Kalan, District Gurdaspur and subsequent proceedings arising therefrom on the basis of compromise stands quashed qua petitioners.
