By invoking Section 482 Cr.P.C., the petitioners have prayed for quashing of FIR No.36 dated 26.03.2014 for offence punishable under Sections 452/324/323/148/149 of the Indian Penal Code, registered at Police Station Baghapurana, District Moga (Annexure P-1) and proceedings emanating therefrom on the basis of compromise dated 07.10.2016 (Annexure P-3) arrived at between the parties.

In the present case, the FIR was registered on the statement of Mohan Singh. Now, dispute between the parties has been resolved by way of compromise dated 07.10.2016 (Annexure P-3).

Vide orders dated 20.07.2017, 22.01.2018 and 20.03.2018, the parties were directed to appear before the trial Court to get their statements recorded with regard to genuineness of compromise.

Pursuant thereto, a report has been submitted by the Sub

Divisional Judicial Magistrate, Baghapurana, wherein it has been reported that statements of the parties have been recorded that the compromise is genuine and valid one which has ex-facie been entered into between the parties with their free volition, without any inducement or threat.

Counsel for the State as well as counsel for respondent Nos.2 to 5 have not disputed that the parties i.e. petitioners and respondent Nos.2 to 5 have arrived at a settlement with an intent to give burial to their differences.

Perusal of allegations in the FIR reveals that the present case squarely falls in the category of cases that can be quashed by the High Court, in exercise of its inherent power under Section 482 Cr.P.C. Keeping in view authoritative enunciation of law laid down by Hon'ble the Supreme Court in 'Gian Singh v. State of Punjab and another', 2012 (4) R.C.R. (Criminal) 543 and in the light of facts and circumstances discussed hereinbefore, this Court is of the considered opinion that continuation of criminal proceedings would amount to abuse of process of law and it is expedient in the interest of justice that the same are put to an end.

For the foregoing reasons, the petition is allowed. FIR No.36 dated 26.03.2014 for offence punishable under Sections 452/324/323/148/149 of the Indian Penal Code, registered at Police Station Baghapurana, District Moga (Annexure P-1) and proceedings emanating therefrom stand quashed qua the petitioners.
