PRAYER: Petition filed under Article 226 of the Constitution of India, to issue a Writ of Habeas Corpus, calling for the records of the detention made in C.No.80/G/I.S/2018 dated 31.07.2018 passed by the Commissioner of Police/Detaining Authority, Coimbatore City the second respondent herein and set aside the same and direct the respondents to produce the detainee before this Hon'ble Court and set the detainee Tmt.R.Ramala @ Ramya, W/o.Ramsh aged 43 years now confined in Special Prison for Women, Coimbatore set her at liberty.

ORDER

[Order of the Court was made by C.T.SELVAM, J.]

The petitioner is the daughter of the detainee herein, viz. R.Ramala @ Ramya, Wife of Ramesh, aged 43 years. The detainee has been detained by the second respondent by his order in C.No.80/G/IS/2018, dated 31.07.2018, holding her to be a "DRUG OFFENDER", as contemplated under Section 2(e) of Tamil Nadu Prevention of Dangerous Activities of Bootleggers, Cyber Law Offenders, Drug Offenders, Forest Offenders, Goondas, Immoral

Traffic Offenders, Sand Offenders, Sexual Offenders, Slum Grabbers and Video Pirates Act, 1982 (Tamil Nadu Act 14 of 1982). The said order is under challenge in this Habeas Corpus Petition.

2. The ground case has been registered against the detenu in Cr.No.801/2018 on the file of the Coimbatore City, C-4 Rathinapuri Police Station, for offences u/s. 8(c) r/w 20(b) (ii) (B) NDPS Act 1985. The detention order has been passed by second respondent in C.No.80/G/IS/2018 on 31.07.2018.

3. We have heard learned counsel for the petitioner and learned Additional Public Prosecutor appearing for the respondents. We have also perused the records produced by the Detaining Authority.

4. Though several grounds have been raised in the Habeas Corpus Petition, the learned counsel appearing for the petitioner would mainly focus his argument on the ground that there is gross violation of procedural safeguards, which would vitiate the detention. The learned counsel, by placing authorities, submitted that the representation made by the petitioner was not considered on time and there was an inordinate and unexplained delay.

5. The learned Additional Public Prosecutor opposed the Habeas Corpus Petition. He would submit that though there was delay in considering the representation, on that score alone, the impugned detention order cannot be quashed. According to the learned Additional Public Prosecutor, no prejudice has been caused to the detenu and thus, there is no violation of the fundamental rights guaranteed under Articles 21 and 22 of the Constitution of India.

6. The Detention Order in question was passed on 31.07.2018. The petitioner made a representation, dated 30.08.2018 and the same was received on 04.09.2018. Thereafter, remarks were called for by the Government from the Detaining Authority on the same day. The remarks were duly received on 11.09.2018. Thereafter, the Government considered the matter and passed the order rejecting the petitioner's representation on 03.10.2018.

7. It is the contention of the petitioner that there was an inordinate delay of 7 days in submitting the remarks by the Detaining Authority, of which 2 days were Saturday and Sunday and hence there was a delay of 7 days in submitting the remarks. Thereafter, there was yet another delay of 21 days in considering the representation, of which 9 days were Saturday, Sunday and hence there was a delay of 12 days in considering representation.

8. In *Rekha vs. State of Tamil Nadu*, reported in 2011 (5) SCC 244, the Honourable Supreme Court has held that the procedural safeguards are required to be zealously watched and enforced by the Courts of law and their rigour cannot be allowed to be diluted on the basis of the nature of the alleged activities undertaken by the detenu.

9. In *Sumaiya vs. The Secretary to Government*, reported in 2007 (2) MWN (Cr.) 145, a Division Bench of this Court has held that the unexplained delay of three days in disposal of the representation made on behalf of the detenu would be sufficient to set aside the order of detention.

10. In *Tara Chand vs. State of Rajasthan and others*, reported in 1980 (2) SCC 321, the Honourable Supreme Court has held that any inordinate and unexplained delay on the part of the Government in considering the representation renders the very detention illegal.

11. In the subject case, admittedly, there is an inordinate and unexplained delay of 7 days in submitting the remarks by the Detaining Authority and 12 days in considering the representation. The impugned detention order is, therefore, liable to be quashed.

12. In the result, the Habeas Corpus Petition is allowed and the order of detention in C.No.80/G/IS/2018, dated 31.07.2018, passed by the second respondent is set aside. The detenu, namely, R.Ramala @ Ramya, wife of Ramesh, aged 43 years, is directed to be released forthwith unless his detention is required in connection with any other case.
