Prayer in these applications is for placing on record affidavits
of petitioner no.1 and respondent no.2.

For reasons mentioned in these applications, affidavits of
petitioner no.1 and respondent no.2 are taken on record.

Applications stand disposed of accordingly.

MAIN

The petitioners have approached this Court by way of instant
petition under Section 482 of the Code of Criminal Procedure (for short
'Cr.P.C.') invoking its inherent jurisdiction for quashing of FIR No.220,
dated 20.04.2019, registered under Sections 120-B/406/420/467/468 IPC, at
Police Station Faridabad Central, District Faridabad and the consequential

proceedings arising therefrom on the basis of compromise.

Notice of motion was issued and the parties were directed to remain present in this Court on the next date of hearing.

Today, the petitioners-accused and the respondent nos.2 and 3 are present, duly identified by their respective counsels. The affidavits of petitioner no.1 and respondent no.2 have been filed with the miscellaneous application, which is listed in urgent. Affidavit of respondent no.3 has been filed in court today, which is also taken on record and marked as 'A'.

Counsel for the petitioners and counsel for the respondent nos.2 and 3 pray that in view of the aforesaid facts, the FIR and all subsequent proceedings emanating therefrom be quashed.

Counsel for the State of Punjab states that in view of the settlement between the parties, the State would not stand in the way of the settlement and would not oppose the quashing of the FIR and all subsequent proceedings emanating therefrom.

I have heard learned counsel for the parties, perused the affidavits filed by the parties. I am of the considered opinion that the petitioners-accused and the respondent nos.2 and 3 have resolved their differences by a bonafide compromise, without any coercion or undue influence. Both the parties acknowledge the settlement/compromise.

In the considered opinion of this Court, it is a fit case for exercising the inherent jurisdiction of this Court under Section 482 Cr.P.C., so as to secure the ends of justice because the parties have arrived at an out of Court settlement by way of compromise. The compromise is without any pressure and a genuine one. In such a situation, continuation of the prosecution would result in sheer abuse of process of law.

For the aforesaid view, this Court finds support from *Kulwinder Singh and others Vs. State of Punjab and another, 2007(3) RCR (Criminal) 1052* and *Gian Singh Vs. State of Punjab and others (2012) 10 SCC 303*,

Considering the peculiar facts and circumstances of the case noted above, coupled with the reasons aforementioned and to secure the ends of justice, FIR No.220, dated 20.04.2019, registered under Sections 120-B/406/420/467/468 IPC, at Police Station Faridabad Central, District Faridabad and the consequential proceedings arising therefrom are ordered to be quashed, however, qua the petitioners only.

Resultantly, with the above-said observations made, the instant petition stands allowed.
