PRAYER : Petition filed under Article 226 of the Constitution of India, to issue a writ of habeas corpus calling for the records relating to the Detention Order passed by the second respondent in Detention Order PDO No.2/2020, dated 05.02.2020 and to quash the same and direct the respondents to produce the body or person of the detenu, Balu @ Balamurugan, son of Manoharan, aged about 32 years, before this Court and set him at liberty, now detained at Central Prison, Trichy.

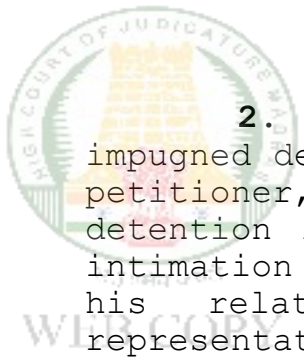

O R D E R

(Order of the Court was made by K.KALYANASUNDARAM, J.)

This habeas corpus petition has been filed by the father of the detenu, namely, Balu @ Balamurugan, aged about 32 years, against the detention order passed by the second respondent, in PDO No.2/2020, dated 05.02.2020, branding him as "Sexual Offender" as contemplated under Section 2(ggg) of Tamil Nadu Act, 14 of 1982.



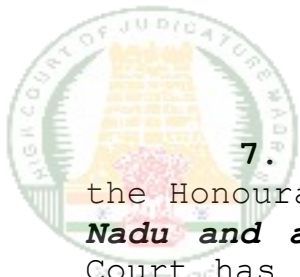
2. Though several grounds have been raised challenging the impugned detention order, Mr.D.Ramesh Kumar, learned counsel for the petitioner, would mainly contend that the impugned order of detention is liable to be set aside on the grounds of failure of intimation of arrest of the detenu either to his family members or his relatives and delay in considering the petitioner's representation.

3. Per contra, Mr.K.Dinesh Babu, learned Additional Public Prosecutor, while reiterating the counter affidavit filed by the second respondent, submitted that the detention order has been rightly passed by the second respondent taking note of the activities of the detenu and it has been passed to prevent the detenu from indulging in similar activities in future. It is the further submission of the learned Additional Public Prosecutor that the the arrest of the detenu has been properly intimated to his family members and the delay in disposal of the representation has not caused any prejudice to the detenu and hence, prayed for dismissal of the habeas corpus petition.

4. We have heard the rival submissions and perused the materials placed on record.

5. In the case on hand, though it is contended by the learned Additional Public Prosecutor that the arrest of the detenu has been properly intimated to the family members of the detenu, a perusal of Page No.14 of the booklet would show that the arrest of the detenu in the ground case on 31.12.2019 was intimated to Cell No.8754207456, but there is nothing on record to show that said cell number belongs to the family members or relatives of the detenu. This Court, following the decision of the Honourable Apex Court in the case of **D.K.Basu vs. State of West Bengal**, reported in **AIR (1997) SC 610**, in several cases, has consistently held that if there is no proper intimation of arrest of the detenu either to his family members or his relatives, his valuable rights would be seriously prejudiced on the sense that they will not have the opportunity to make effective representation to the Authority concerned in time for revocation of the detention order.

6. Further, it is seen from the proforma furnished by the learned Additional Public Prosecutor that the representation of the petitioner, dated 25.02.2020, was received on 28.02.2020. Remarks were called for on the same day i.e.28.02.2020 and it was received on 04.05.2020. The Deputy Secretary dealt with the matter on the same day i.e.04.05.2020. The concerned Minister dealt with the matter on 25.05.2020 and the representation came to be rejected on 26.05.2020. It is seen that in between 04.05.2020 and 25.05.2020, there was a delay of fourteen days, after excluding the Government Holidays of six days, in considering the petitioner's representation.



7. At this juncture, it is useful to refer the decision of the Honourable Apex Court in the case of **Rajammal vs. State of Tamil Nadu and another**, reported in **1999 (1) SCC 417**, wherein the Apex Court has observed and held that it is for the Authority concerned to explain the delay, if any, in disposal of the representation and if any delay was caused on account of nay indifference or lapse in considering the representation, such delay will adversely affect further detention of the prisoner.

8. In the case on hand, as stated supra, the delay of fourteen days has not been properly explained by the respondents. Hence, in our considered view, the detention order is liable to be set aside on the grounds as stated above by following the decisions of the Honourable Apex Court referred supra.

9. In fine, the Habeas Corpus Petition is allowed. The order of detention passed by the second respondent, in PDO No.2/2020, dated 05.02.2020, is set aside. Consequently, the detenu, namely, Balu @ Balamurugan, son of Manoharan, aged about 32 years, who is now detained at Central Prison, Trichy, is directed to be released forthwith unless his presence or custody or detention is required in connection with any other case.

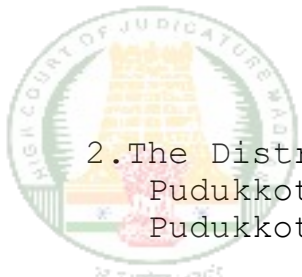
