Petitioners seek anticipatory bail.

Learned advocate appearing for the petitioners submits that there was an incident with regard to the disputes arise in the locality and there are cases and counter cases in between the parties.

Learned advocate appearing for the State draws attention of the Court to the injury report and the statement recorded under Section 161 of the Code of Criminal Procedure.

Considering the facts and circumstances of the case, injury report and the statement under Section 161 of the Code

of Criminal Procedure, we are inclined to grant anticipatory bail to the petitioners.

Accordingly, we direct that in the event of arrest the petitioners shall be released on bail upon furnishing a bond of Rs.10,000/- each, with two sureties of like amount each, to the satisfaction of the arresting officer and also be subject to the conditions as laid down under Section 438(2) of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1973 and on further conditions that the petitioners no. 1 and 4 shall meet the investigating officer once in a week until further orders and petitioners no. 2 and 3 shall co-operate with the investigation and they shall appear before the jurisdictional court and pray for regular bail within a period of four weeks from date.

This application for anticipatory bail is, thus, allowed.
