PRAYER: Petition filed under Article 226 of the Constitution of India, to issue a Writ of Habeas Corpus, calling for the entire records, connected with the detention order of the respondent No.2 in M.H.S.Confdl No:25/2021, dated 17.03.2021 and quash the same and direct the respondents to produce the body or person of the detenu by name Poothapandi, son of Mookkathevar, aged about 39 years, now detained as "Goonda" at Palayamkottai Central Prison before this Court and set him at liberty forthwith.

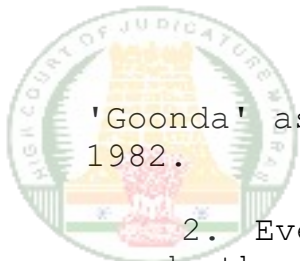

O R D E R

[Order of the Court was made by V.BHARATHIDASAN, J.]

This habeas corpus petition has been filed by the mother of the detenu, namely, Poothapandi, son of Mookkathevar, aged about 39 years, against the detention order passed by the second respondent, in H.S.(MD) Confdl No.25/2021, dated 17.03.2021, branding him as



'Goonda' as contemplated under Section 2(f) of Tamil Nadu Act, 14 of 1982.

2. Even though the petitioner has raised several grounds to quash the impugned detention order, the learned counsel appearing for the petitioner would mainly place arguments on the ground of delay in disposal of the petitioner's representation. In this regard, the learned counsel for the petitioner would state that the procedural safeguards guaranteed under Articles 21 and 22 of the Constitution of India have not been followed in this case and there is unexplained and inordinate delay in disposal of the petitioner's representation, which would vitiate the impugned order of detention.

3. Mr.S.Ravi, learned Additional Public Prosecutor appearing for the respondents, on instructions, submitted that after satisfying with the materials placed by the Sponsoring Authority, the Detaining Authority has passed the detention order and there is no illegality or infirmity in the detention order. It is also stated that even if there is any delay in disposal of the representation, it has not caused any prejudice to the rights of the detenu and hence, prayed for dismissal of the habeas corpus petition.

4. Heard the learned counsel appearing on either side and perused the materials available on record.

5. In the instant case, the proforma furnished by the learned Additional Public Prosecutor would indicate that as against the impugned detention order, the petitioner made a representation to the first respondent on 12.08.2021 and it was received on 23.08.2021. Remarks were called for on 23.08.2021 and it was received on 07.10.2021. The Deputy Secretary dealt with the matter on 08.10.2021. The concerned Minister dealt with the matter on 12.10.2021 and the representation came to be rejected on 28.10.2021. It is seen that in between 23.08.2021 and 07.10.2021, there was a delay of 30 days, after excluding the Government Holidays of 14 days, in considering the petitioner's representation.

6. At this juncture, it is useful to refer the decision of the Honourable Apex Court in the case of **Rajammal vs. State of Tamil Nadu and another**, reported in **1999 (1) SCC 417**, wherein the Apex Court has observed and held that it is for the Authority concerned to explain the delay, if any, in disposal of the representation and if any delay was caused on account of nay indifference or lapse in considering the representation, such delay will adversely affect further detention of the prisoner.

7. In the case on hand, as stated supra, the delay of 30 days in considering the representation of the petitioner has not been properly explained by the respondents. Hence, in our considered



view, the detention order is liable to be set aside solely on the ground of delay by following the decision of the Honourable Apex Court referred supra.

8. In fine, the Habeas Corpus Petition is allowed. The detention order made in H.S.(M) Confdl No.25/2021, dated 17.03.2021, passed by the second respondent, is set aside. Consequently, the detenu, namely, Poothapandi, S/o.Mookkathevar, aged about 39 years, who is now detained at Central Prison, Palayamkottai, is directed to be released forthwith unless his presence or custody or detention is required in connection with any other case.
