Heard through video conferencing.

On 14.10.2020, the following order was passed:-

“Heard through video conferencing.

This is a petition under Section 482 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1973 for quashing of FIR No.113 dated 08.05.2016 under Sections 420, 494, 495 of the Indian Penal Code, 1860 registered at Police Station, Rajpura City, Patiala (Annexure P-1) and all subsequent proceedings arising therefrom, on the basis of the compromise dated 01.10.2020 (Annexure P-2).

Learned counsel for the petitioners has contended that the parties have since entered into a compromise which has been reduced into writing on 01.10.2020, a copy whereof has been attached as Annexure P2 with the petition. The complainant/respondent No.2 now does not want to pursue the present FIR as all disputes between the parties stands amicably resolved. He further relies on the judgment

of this Court in Kulwinder Singh and others Vs. State of Punjab and another, 2007 (3) RCR 1052 to contend that even in non-compoundable offences, if the parties have entered into a compromise, this Court has wide powers under Section 482 CrPC to quash the proceedings to prevent abuse of law and secure the ends of justice.

Notice of motion.

On the asking of the Court, Mr. Ramandeep Sandhu, Senior DAG, Punjab has put in appearance through video conferencing (VC) and accepts notice on behalf of the respondent-State. Mr. Rakesh Gupta, Advocate accepts notice on behalf of respondent No.2/complainant through VC and has confirmed the fact that the parties have reached a compromise and that the matter stands amicably resolved.

Adjourned to 17.12.2020.

Meanwhile, the parties are directed to appear before the concerned CJM/Illaq Magistrate/Trial Court on 03.11.2020, or on any other date convenient to the Court, for recording of their statements. The CJM/Illaq Magistrate/Trial Court is directed to record the statements of the parties to its satisfaction qua the genuineness of the compromise and that the same is not the result of any undue influence, coercion or pressure of any kind. A report, along-with the statements of the parties, on the following points be sent to this Court before the next date of hearing:

- 1) Whether the settlement/compromise dated 01.10.2020 has been freely entered into by the parties without any undue influence, coercion or pressure of any kind.*
- 2) Whether any other criminal cases are pending against the parties.*
- 3) Whether the proclamation proceedings are pending against either of the parties.”*

The statements of the parties have since been recorded and the report dated 24.11.2020 has been received from the Judicial Magistrate First Class, Rajpura wherein it has been stated that the compromise dated 01.10.2020 has been entered into voluntarily between the parties and the same is without any undue influence, coercion or pressure. Neither any proclamation proceedings nor any other criminal case is pending against the parties.

The Apex Court in the case of “**Gian Singh V/s State of Punjab &Anr.**” 2012 (10) SCC 303, has held as under:-

“57. The position that emerges from the above discussion can be summarised thus: the power of the High Court in quashing a criminal proceeding or FIR or complaint in exercise of its inherent jurisdiction is distinct and different from the power given to a criminal court for compounding the offences under Section 320 of the Code. Inherent power is of wide plenitude with no statutory limitation but it has to be exercised in accord with the guideline engrafted in such power viz; (i) to secure the ends of justice or (ii) to prevent abuse of the process of any Court. In what cases power to quash the criminal proceeding or complaint or F.I.R may be exercised where the offender and victim have settled their dispute would depend on the facts and circumstances of each case and no category can be prescribed. However, before exercise of such power, the High Court must have due regard to the nature and gravity of the crime. Heinous and serious offences of mental depravity or offences like murder, rape, dacoity, etc. cannot be fittingly quashed even though the victim or victim's family and the offender have settled the dispute. Such offences are not private in nature and have serious impact on society. Similarly, any

compromise between the victim and offender in relation to the offences under special statutes like Prevention of Corruption Act or the offences committed by public servants while working in that capacity etc; cannot provide for any basis for quashing criminal proceedings involving such offences. But the criminal cases having overwhelmingly and pre-dominantly civil flavour stand on different footing for the purposes of quashing, particularly the offences arising from commercial, financial, mercantile, civil, partnership or such like transactions or the offences arising out of matrimony relating to dowry, etc. or the family disputes where the wrong is basically private or personal in nature and the parties have resolved their entire dispute. In this category of cases, High Court may quash criminal proceedings if in its view, because of the compromise between the offender and victim, the possibility of conviction is remote and bleak and continuation of criminal case would put accused to great oppression and prejudice and extreme injustice would be caused to him by not quashing the criminal case despite full and complete settlement and compromise with the victim. In other words, the High Court must consider whether it would be unfair or contrary to the interest of justice to continue with the criminal proceeding or continuation of the criminal proceeding would tantamount to abuse of process of law despite settlement and compromise between the victim and wrongdoer and whether to secure the ends of justice, it is appropriate that criminal case is put to an end and if the answer to the above question(s) is in affirmative, the High Court shall be well within its jurisdiction to quash the criminal proceeding.”

Learned counsel for the petitioner has also referred to the

law laid down by this Court in “**Kulwinder Singh &Ors. Vs. State of Punjab &Anr.**” 2007 (3) RCR (Criminal) 1052, wherein it has been held that even in non-compoundable offences, if the parties have entered into a compromise, this Court has wide powers under Section 482 CrPC to quash the proceedings to prevent abuse of law and secure the ends of justice.

In view of the above and keeping in view the report sent by the Judicial Magistrate First Class, Rajpura stating that the parties have genuinely entered into a compromise and all the disputes between the parties have been resolved, it would not be in the interest of justice to continue the criminal proceedings.

Resultantly, FIR No.113 dated 08.05.2016 under Sections 420, 494, 495 of the Indian Penal Code, 1860 registered at Police Station, Rajpura City, Patiala (Annexure P-1) as well as all the subsequent proceedings arising there-from, stand quashed.

The petition is accordingly allowed.
