ORDER :

1. By this present Petition, the Petitioner seeks Legal Heirship Certificate under Section 2 of the Bombay Regulation Act, VIII of 1827 in respect of the deceased Karsan Meghji Dhadhi alias Karsanbhai Meghji Dhadhi alias Karsan M. Dhadhi. A copy of the death certificate is annexed at Exhibit 'A' to the Petition. The deceased was survived by the Petitioner, son and three daughters of the deceased mentioned in the tabular form at paragraph 4 of the Petition. Save and except those mentioned therein, there are no other

legal heirs surviving the deceased.

2. It is stated in paragraph 6 of the Petition that the Legal Heirship Certificate is required for transfer of immovable property described in the said paragraph in favour of the Petitioners.

3. The other heirs of the deceased have filed their consent affidavits dated 21st May, 2022 by which they have given their full and free consent for issuance of the Legal Heirship Certificate in favour of the Petitioner without service of any proclamation upon them and without justifying any surety for their share in the property left by the deceased.

4. No other Petition for Legal Heirship Certificate, Succession Certificate, Probate or Letters of Administration with or without Will annexed, has been filed. Therefore, I do not find any impediment in granting the reliefs sought for in the present Petition.

5. The Petition is accepted and allowed in terms of prayer clause (a) which reads thus:-

“(a) That a Legal Heirship Certificate be granted in favour of Petitioner along with heirs mentioned in paragraph 4 above certifying them as legal heirs / representatives of the said deceased under the provision of Bombay Regulation Act, VII of 1827.”

6. Proclamation is dispensed with.
7. The Petition is accordingly disposed of. No order as to costs.
