Instant petition has been filed under Section 482 Cr.P.C. praying for quashing of FIR No.58, dated 06.05.2003, under Sections 498-A, 406, 494, 420, 467, 468, 471, 120-B of IPC at Police Station Ramdas, Tehsil Ajnala, District Amritsar along with subsequent proceedings arising therefrom on the basis of compromise and affidavit dated 19.04.2021 (Annexure P-4) and further to quash the order dated 06.12.2003 passed by the learned Sub Division Judicial Magistrate, Ajnala vide which the petitioners have been declared proclaimed offender.

FIR in question was got registered by complainant-respondent No.2 and the investigation commenced thereon. However, with the intervention of respectables, finally the parties arrived at settlement and they

resolved their inter se dispute, which is apparent from Compromise Deed, annexed as Annexure P-4. On the basis of the compromise, the petitioners are invoking the inherent power of this Court by praying that continuation of these proceedings would be a futile exercise and an abuse of process of the Court and thus, the FIR in question and all the subsequent proceedings arising therefrom may be quashed in the interest of justice.

This Court vide order dated 06.07.2021 directed the parties to appear before the trial Court/Illaq Magistrate for recording their statements, as contended before the Court, and the trial Court/Illaq Magistrate was also directed to send its report.

In pursuance to the same, learned Judicial Magistrate Ist Class, Ajnala has sent her report dated 20.08.2021 to this Court. With the report she has also annexed the original statement of respondent No.2-Manjit Kaur; statement of Prithpal Singh (special power of attorney holder of petitioners namely, Manjit Singh and Lovejeet Kaur) recorded on 03.08.2021 and also statement of ASI Sushil Kumar recorded on 16.08.2021. On the basis of the statements, learned Judicial Magistrate Ist Class, Ajnala has concluded in the report that the compromise effected between the parties is genuine and without any coercion or undue influence. It has further mentioned in the report that as per police record, there were total seven accused namely, Manjit Singh, Amardeep Kaur, Mandeep Kaur, Prithpal Singh, Kulwant Kaur, Karnail Singh and Lovepreet Kaur in FIR No.58 dated 06.05.2003. Accused Manjit Singh and Lovepreet Kaur were declared proclaimed offenders vide order dated 06.12.2003 by the Court SDJM, Ajnala. Accused Amardeep Kaur, Mandeep Kaur, Prithpal Singh, Kulwant Kaur and Karnail Singh were acquitted vide judgment dated

14.11.2011 by the Court of JMIC, Ajnala.

I have heard learned counsel for the parties, perused the record and the report sent by learned Judicial Magistrate Ist Class, Ajnala.

A bare perusal of statutory provision of the 482 Cr.P.C. would show that the High Court may make such orders, as may be necessary to give effect to any order under this Code or to prevent abuse of the process of any Court or otherwise to secure the ends of justice. Section 320 Cr.P.C. is equally relevant for consideration, which prescribes the procedure for compounding of the offences under the Indian Penal Code.

Keeping in view the nature of offences allegedly committed and the fact that both the parties have amicably settled their dispute, the continuation of criminal prosecution would be a futile exercise. The Hon'ble Supreme Court in a number of cases including ***Narinder Singh and others Versus State of Punjab and another, 2014 (6) SCC 466***; ***B.S.Joshi and others vs State of Haryana and another (2003) 4 Supreme Court Cases 675*** followed by this Court in Full Bench case of ***Kulwinder Singh and others Vs. State of Punjab and another, 2007(3) RCR 1052*** have dealt with the proposition involved in the present case and settled the law.

Thereafter, Hon'ble Supreme Court in *Gian Singh vs State of Punjab and another (2012) 10 Supreme Court Cases 303* further dealt with the issue and the earlier law settled by the Supreme Court for quashing of the FIR in *State of Haryana vs Bhajan Lal, 1992 Supp (1) SCC 335*. Para 61 of the judgment reads as under:-

“61. The position that emerges from the above discussion can be summarised thus: the power of the High Court in quashing a criminal proceeding or FIR or complaint in exercise of its inherent jurisdiction is distinct and different

from the power given to a criminal court for compounding the offences under Section 320 of the Code. Inherent power is of wide plenitude with no statutory limitation but it has to be exercised in accord with the guideline engrafted in such power viz; (i) to secure the ends of justice, or (ii) to prevent abuse of the process of any Court. In what cases power to quash the criminal proceeding or complaint or F.I.R may be exercised where the offender and victim have settled their dispute would depend on the facts and circumstances of each case and no category can be prescribed. However, before exercise of such power, the High Court must have due regard to the nature and gravity of the crime. Heinous and serious offences of mental depravity or offences like murder, rape, dacoity, etc. cannot be fittingly quashed even though the victim or victim's family and the offender have settled the dispute. Such offences are not private in nature and have serious impact on society. Similarly, any compromise between the victim and offender in relation to the offences under special statutes like Prevention of Corruption Act or the offences committed by public servants while working in that capacity, etc; cannot provide for any basis for quashing criminal proceedings involving such offences. But the criminal cases having overwhelmingly and pre-dominantly civil flavour stand on a different footing for the purposes of quashing, particularly the offences arising from commercial, financial, mercantile, civil, partnership or such like transactions or the offences arising out of matrimony relating to dowry, etc. or the family disputes where the wrong is basically private or personal in nature and the parties have resolved their entire dispute. In this category of cases, the High Court may quash criminal proceedings if in its view, because of the compromise between the offender and the victim, the possibility of conviction is remote and bleak and continuation of the criminal case would put the accused to great oppression and prejudice and extreme injustice would be caused to him by not quashing the criminal case despite full and complete

settlement and compromise with the victim. In other words, the High Court must consider whether it would be unfair or contrary to the interest of justice to continue with the criminal proceeding or continuation of the criminal proceeding would tantamount to abuse of process of law despite settlement and compromise between the victim and the wrongdoer and whether to secure the ends of justice, it is appropriate that criminal case is put to an end and if the answer to the above question(s) is in the affirmative, the High Court shall be well within its jurisdiction to quash the criminal proceeding.”

Learned counsel for the petitioners submits that in this FIR, there were six accused, out of which, four accused have already been tried by the trial Court and have been acquitted vide order dated 14.11.2011. He has submitted that petitioner No.1 before this Court is the husband and petitioner No.2 is not even related to the complainant. However, both the parties have settled the dispute amicably. He submits that the petitioners are residents of Germany and have been declared proclaimed offender. He has submitted that the parties have duly compromised the matter and their prosecution in the FIR is nothing but an abuse of the process of the Court.

Learned counsel for the complainant, at the outset, endorsed the submissions made by counsel for the petitioners.

While exercising the power under Section 482 Cr.P.C., the Court is guided by various judicial precedent laid down by the Hon'ble Supreme Court. For exercising its jurisdiction, the Court is to keep into consideration the factors like:- nature and gravity of the offence, where quashing of the offence would have an adverse impact on the society as a whole. Perusing the facts and circumstances of the present case, it is evident that the case in hand has arisen out of the matrimonial discord. Both the parties have amicably settled the dispute for the betterment of their future. They have decided to

bury the hatchet in order to live peacefully.

In view of the judgment by the Hon'ble Supreme Court titled as ***Mrs. Shakuntala Sawhney v. Mrs. Kaushalya Sawhney and Ors., (1980) 1 SCC 63, Hon'ble Krishna Iyer, J. aptly summoned up the essence of compromise in the following words: "The finest hour of justice arrives propitiously when parties, despite falling apart, bury the hatchet and weave a sense of fellowship of reunion."***, this Court finds that the plea taken by the petitioners qualifies for its acceptance on the anvil of the settled law.

Applying the law settled by Hon'ble Supreme Court in plethora of judgments and this High Court, it is apparent that when the parties have entered into a compromise, then continuation of the proceedings would be merely an abuse of process of the Court and by allowing and accepting the prayer of the petitioners by quashing the FIR would be securing the ends of justice, which is primarily the object of the legislature enacting under Section 482 Cr.P.C.

In the opinion of this Court, the ends of justice would be met in putting to rest the ongoing legal battle between the parties and hence, by exercising the power under Section 482 Cr.P.C., order dated 06.12.2003, by virtue of which, the petitioners have been declared proclaimed offender is quashed in the interest of justice.

As a result, this Court finds that the case in hand squarely falls within the ambit and parameters settled by judicial precedents and hence, FIR No.58, dated 06.05.2003, under Sections 498-A, 406, 494, 420, 467, 468, 471, 120-B of IPC at Police Station Ramdas, Tehsil Ajnala, District Amritsar along with subsequent proceedings arising therefrom are hereby quashed *qua* the petitioners on the basis of compromise.

Needless to say that the parties shall remain bound by the terms and conditions of the compromise and their statements recorded before the Court below.

Petition stands allowed.
