Prayer in this application under Section 482 Cr.P.C. is for preponment of the main case.

In view of the averments made in the application and arguments advanced by the learned counsel for the applicants, the application is allowed and the main case is preponed to today and is taken on board today itself.

Application stands disposed of.

CRM-M-51282-2022

The instant petition has been filed under Section 482 Cr.P.C., seeking quashing of FIR No.0005 dated 23.01.2022 (Annexure P/1) under Sections 323, 325, 34 IPC registered at Police Station Sadar Raikot, District

Ludhiana Rural, challan presented under Section 323, 325, 34, 201 IPC against the petitioners and all other consequential proceedings arising out of the aforesaid FIR on the basis of Compromise dated 31.10.2022 (Annexure P/2), effected between the parties.

In terms of order dated 07.11.2022, learned JMIC, Jagraon has submitted her report dated 14.11.2022. The relevant extracts of the report are as below :-

“Pursuant to the order dated 07.11.2022 passed by Hon'ble Punjab and Haryana High Court in CRM-M-51282 of 2022 in case titled as Jagdeep Singh @ Jagdeep Singh Pannu and Another Vs State of Punjab and another, report is hereby submitted to the effect that the statement of respondents No.2 Paramjit Singh son of Jagtar Singh, resident of Burj Hakimian, P.S. Sadar Raikot, Ludhiana, District Ludhiana and Petitioners/accused namely Jagdeep Singh @ Jagdeep Singh Pannu son of Sh. Rajpal Singh and Sandeep Singh son of Tarlochan Singh both residents of Burj Hakimian, P.S. Sadar Raikot, Ludhiana, District Ludhiana recorded. This Court is satisfied that the parties have made an amicable settlement and have recorded their statements in the Court without any fear, pressure, threat or coercion and out of their free will.

It is further submitted that statement of Investigation Officer ASI Jang Singh No.386/Ldh(R) now posted at P.S. Sadar Raikot, recorded to the effect that the present case was registered on the statement of complainant-Paramjit Singh son of Jagtar Singh against accused Jagdeep Singh @ Jagdeep Singh Pannu son of Rajpal Singh and Sandeep Singh son of Tarlochan Singh. He further stated that no accused is proclaimed offender in the present case nor any other proceedings

are pending against the accused.”

Learned State counsel submits that he has no objection if the present FIR and consequential proceedings are quashed.

Relying upon its earlier judgments in 'Gian Singh Vs. State of Punjab and others, (2012) 10 SCC 303' and 'The State of Madhya Pradesh Vs. Laxmi Narayan and others (2019) 5 SCC 688', a two Judge Bench of the Hon'ble Supreme Court in 'Ramgopal and another Vs. State of Madhya Pradesh 2021 SCC online SC 834' while dealing with power of High Court under Section 482 of Cr.P.C. to quash non-compoundable offences on the basis of compromise between the disputing parties has held:

“11. True it is that offences which are ‘non-compoundable’ cannot be compounded by a criminal court in purported exercise of its powers under [Section 320 Cr.P.C.](#) Any such attempt by the court would amount to alteration, addition and modification of [Section 320 Cr.P.C.](#), which is the exclusive domain of Legislature. There is no patent or latent ambiguity in the language of [Section 320 Cr.P.C.](#), which may justify its wider interpretation and include such offences in the docket of ‘compoundable’ offences which have been consciously kept out as non-compoundable. Nevertheless, the limited jurisdiction to compound an offence within the framework of [Section 320 Cr.P.C.](#) is not an embargo against invoking inherent powers by the High Court vested in it under [Section 482 Cr.P.C.](#) The High Court, keeping in view the peculiar facts and circumstances of a case and for justifiable reasons can press [Section 482 Cr.P.C.](#) in aid to prevent abuse of the process of any Court and/or to secure the ends of justice.

12. The High Court, therefore, having regard to

the nature of the offence and the fact that parties have amicably settled their dispute and the victim has willingly consented to the nullification of criminal proceedings, can quash such proceedings in exercise of its inherent powers under [Section 482](#) Cr.P.C., even if the offences are non-compoundable. The High Court can indubitably evaluate the consequential effects of the offence beyond the body of an individual and thereafter adopt a pragmatic approach, to ensure that the felony, even if goes unpunished, does not tinker with or paralyze the very object of the administration of criminal justice system.

13. It appears to us that criminal proceedings involving non-heinous offences or where the offences are pre-dominantly of a private nature, can be annulled irrespective of the fact that trial has already been concluded or appeal stands dismissed against conviction. Handing out punishment is not the sole form of delivering justice. Societal method of applying laws evenly is always subject to lawful exceptions. It goes without saying, that the cases where compromise is struck post-conviction, the High Court ought to exercise such discretion with rectitude, keeping in view the circumstances surrounding the incident, the fashion in which the compromise has been arrived at, and with due regard to the nature and seriousness of the offence, besides the conduct of the accused, before and after the incidence. The touchstone for exercising the extraordinary power under [Section 482](#) Cr.P.C. would be to secure the ends of justice. There can be no hard and fast line constricting the power of the High Court to do substantial justice. A restrictive construction of inherent powers under [Section 482](#) Cr.P.C. may lead to rigid or

specious justice, which in the given facts and circumstances of a case, may rather lead to grave injustice. On the other hand, in cases where heinous offences have been proved against perpetrators, no such benefit ought to be extended, as cautiously observed by this Court in [Narinder Singh & Ors. vs. State of Punjab & Ors.](#)³ and [Laxmi Narayan \(Supra\)](#).

14. In other words, grave or serious offences or offences which involve moral turpitude or have a harmful effect on the social and moral fabric of the society or involve matters concerning public policy, cannot be construed betwixt two individuals or groups only, for such offences have the potential to impact the society at large. Effacing abominable offences through quashing process would not only send a wrong signal to the community but may also accord an undue benefit to unscrupulous habitual or professional offenders, who can secure a 'settlement' through duress, threats, social boycotts, bribes or other dubious means. It is well said that "let no guilty man escape, if it can be avoided."

From the perusal of the enclosed FIR, report of the Trial Court and compromise arrived between the parties, it transpires that contesting parties have amicably resolved their issue, thus, no useful purpose would be served by continuing the proceedings. The alleged offences are of predominantly private in nature and no moral turpitude or interest of public at large is involved. There appears to be no chance of conviction, the continuance of the proceedings would just waste valuable judicial time and it is well-known fact that courts are already over burdened.

In view of above facts and circumstances, the present petition deserves to be allowed and accordingly is allowed. FIR No.0005 dated

23.01.2022 registered at Police Station Sadar Raikot, District Ludhiana under Sections 323, 325 and 34 of the IPC (Challan presented under Sections 323, 325, 34 and 201 IPC) and all other consequential proceedings arising therefrom are quashed qua the petitioners.
