Petition filed under Article 226 of the Constitution of India praying for issuance of a writ of habeas corpus to call for the entire records relating to petitioner's son detention under Tamil Nadu Act 14 of 1982



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vide detention order dated 30.01.2023 on the file of the second respondent herein made in proceedings No.23/BCDFGISSSV/2023 and quash the same as illegal and consequently direct the respondents herein to produce the petitioner's son namely Kadhar Basha, aged 24 years, son of Noor Mohamed, before this Court and set him at liberty, now petitioner's son detained at Central Prison, Puzhal, Chennai – 600 066.

ORDER

[Order of the Court was made by M.SUNDAR, J.]

When the captioned 'Habeas Corpus Petition' [hereinafter 'HCP' for the sake of convenience and clarity] was listed in the Admission Board on 27.03.2023, this Court made the following order:

'Captioned Habeas Corpus Petition has been filed in this Court on 17.03.2023 inter alia assailing a detention order dated 30.01.2023 bearing reference No.23/BCDFGISSSV/2023 made by 'second respondent' [hereinafter 'Detaining Authority' for the sake of convenience and clarity]. To be noted, third respondent is the Sponsoring Authority.



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2. To be noted, mother of the detenu is the petitioner.

3. Mr.C.C.Chellappan, learned counsel on record for habeas corpus petitioner is before us. Learned counsel for petitioner submits that ground case qua the detenu is for alleged offences under Sections 341, 294(b), 392, 397, 336 and 506(ii) of 'Indian Penal Code, 1860 (Act 45 of 1860)' ['IPC' for brevity] in Crime No.06 of 2023 on the file of T-12, Poonamallee Police Station.

4. The aforementioned detention order has been made on the premise that the detenu is a 'Goonda' under Section 2(f) of 'The Tamil Nadu Prevention of Dangerous Activities of Bootleggers, Cyber law offenders, Drug-offenders, Forest-offenders, Goondas, Immoral traffic offenders, Sand-offenders, Sexual-offenders, Slum-grabbers and Video Pirates Act, 1982 (Tamil Nadu Act No.14 of 1982)' [hereinafter 'Act 14 of 1982' for the sake of convenience and clarity].

5. The detention order has been assailed inter alia on the ground that some of the documents found in the booklet supplied to the detenu were illegible which prevented the detenu from making an effective representation.

6. Prima facie case made out for admission. Admit. Issue Rule nisi returnable by four weeks.

7. Mr.R.Muniyapparaj, learned Additional Public Prosecutor, State of Tamil Nadu accepts notice for all respondents. List the captioned Habeas Corpus Petition accordingly.'



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2. The aforementioned order made in the 27.03.2023 Admission listing shall be read as an integral part and parcel of this order which means that the short forms, short references and abbreviations used in the order in the Admission listing shall be used in the instant order also.

3. There are three adverse cases and one ground case. The ground case which constitutes part of substratum of the impugned preventive detention order is Crime No.06 of 2023 on the file of T-12 Poonamallee Police Station for alleged offences under Sections 341, 294(b), 392, 397, 336 and 506(ii) of IPC. Owing to the nature of the challenge to the impugned preventive detention order, it is not necessary to delve into the factual matrix or be detained further by facts.

4. Mr.C.C.Chellappan, learned counsel on record for petitioner and Mr.E.Raj Thilak, learned State Additional Public Prosecutor for all respondents are before us.

5. At the time of admission board, the point that some of the documents found in the booklet supplied to the detenu were illegible which prevented the detenu from making an effective representation. was urged, in the final hearing, learned counsel for petitioner projected his argument qua challenge to the impugned preventive detention order on one point and that one point turns on not providing translated copy of a



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document (relied on by the detaining authority) in a language which the detenu is conversant with. Learned counsel advertent to page 111 of the grounds booklet submitted that copy of Arrest Intimation Form in Tamil has not been given to the detenu.

6. We had the benefit of perusing the booklet. We also noticed that Arrest Intimation Form forms part of the ground on which the impugned preventive detention order has been made. As this turns on obtaining scenario which comes to light from the booklet which is before us, learned State Additional Public Prosecutor does not have much of a say.

7. Be that as it may, we are informed that the literacy level of the detenu is 9th standard and he is a school drop out. We are also informed that the detenu is conversant only with Tamil. We remind ourselves of Powanammal case i.e., ***Powanammal Vs. State of Tamil Nadu***, wherein Hon'ble Supreme Court addressed itself to this translation point in a similar fact situation. The question which the Hon'ble Supreme Court addressed itself to is captured in paragraph 6 and the manner in which a Hon'ble Bench of the Supreme Court answered this question is captured in paragraph 16. To be noted, ***Powanammal*** case is reported in **(1999) 2 SCC 413** and paragraphs 6 and 16 {as in SCC journal} read as



follows:

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'6. The short question that falls for our consideration is whether failure to supply the Tamil version of the order of remand passed in English, a language not known to the detenue, would vitiate her further detention.

16. For the above reasons, in our view, the non-supply of the Tamil version of the English document, on the facts and in the circumstances, renders her continued detention illegal. We, therefore, direct that the detenue be set free forthwith unless she is required to be detained in any other case. The appeal is accordingly allowed. '

8. In the case on hand, we find that Arrest Intimation Form which has been relied on as part of the grounds of detention qua impugned detention order is a crucial document and not furnishing translation of the same in Tamil, the lone language known to the detenu, has impaired his constitutional right to make an effective representation qua the impugned detention order. We therefore have no hesitation in saying that the impugned detention order deserves to be dislodged.



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9. Ergo, the sequitur is, captioned HCP is allowed. Impugned

detention order dated 30.01.2023 bearing reference No.23/BCDFGISSSV/2023 made by the second respondent is set aside and the detenu Thiru. Kadhar Basha, aged 24 years, Son of Thiru.Noor Mohamed, is directed to be set at liberty forthwith, if not required in connection with any other case / cases. There shall be no order as to costs.
