The petitioners have filed the present petition under Section 482 of the Cr.P.C. for quashing of Rapat No. 20 dated 11.10.2014 registered under Sections 307/34 of the IPC and Section 25/27/54/59 of the Arms Act, at Police Station Fatehgarh Churian (Annexure P-1) as a cross-version to FIR No.81 dated 10.10.2014 and all consequential proceedings arising therefrom on the basis of compromise dated 19.11.2014 (Annexures P-3) effected between the private parties.

Pursuant to order dated 11.02.2019 of a co-ordinate Bench of this Court, petitioners no.2 and 3 and respondents no. 2 to 4 appeared before learned Judicial Magistrate Ist Class, Batala, to get their statements recorded. Learned Judicial Magistrate Ist Class, Batala, submitted her report dated 08.04.2019 along with the original statements of the aforesaid parties, which is taken on record.

On an application moved by learned counsel for the petitioners, pursuant to the order dated 23.02.2023, petitioner no.1 appeared before Learned Judicial Magistrate Ist Class, Batala, to get record his statement. That Court submitted his report dated 13.03.2023 along with the original statement of petitioner no.1, which is also taken on record.

It is now well settled that the High Court has inherent power to quash the criminal proceedings in non-compoundable cases on the basis of settlement between the parties for securing the ends of justice or to prevent abuse of the process where the possibility of conviction is remote and bleak and continuation of the criminal case would put the accused to great oppression and prejudice and extreme injustice would be caused to him by not quashing the criminal case. Criminal cases having overwhelmingly and predominantly civil character particularly those arising out of commercial transaction or arising out of matrimonial relationship or family dispute can be quashed when the parties have resolved their entire dispute among themselves. However, such power cannot be exercised in those prosecutions which involve heinous and serious offences of mental depravity or offences like murder, rape dacoity, etc. which are not private in nature and have a serious impact on society. Similarly, prosecution for offences alleged to have been committed under special enactments like the Prevention of Corruption Act or the offences committed by public servant while working in that capacity cannot be quashed on the basis of compromise between the victim and the offender. For judicial precedents in this regard, reference may be made to **Gian Singh Vs. State of Punjab and another : 2012(4) RCR Criminal) 543, Narinder Singh Vs. State of Punjab (Supreme Court) :**

2014 (2) RCR (Criminal) 482, State of Madhya Pradesh Vs. Laxmi Narayan and others (Supreme Court) : 2019 (2) RCR (Criminal) 255 and Kulwinder Singh and others Vs. State of Punjab and others (Punjab and Haryana High Court) : 2007 (3) RCR (Criminal) 1052.

According to the aforesaid reports, both learned Judicial Magistrates, Batala, are satisfied that compromise effected between the parties is genuine, voluntary, without any coercion or undue influence.

Considering the separate reports dated 08.04.2019 and 13.03.2023 of learned Judicial Magistrate Ist Class, Batala, and the fact that the compromise will bring peace and harmony between the parties, aforesaid Rapat No. 20 dated 11.10.2014 and all subsequent proceedings arising therefrom, are quashed, qua the petitioners only.

Disposed of, accordingly.
