HARPREET SINGH BRAR J. (ORAL)

1. The present petition has been filed under Section 482 of Cr.P.C. seeking quashing of the order dated 07.12.2015 (Annexure P-3) passed by learned Additional Sessions Judge, Amritsar vide which the petitioners have been declared as proclaimed offenders in FIR No. 27 dated 01.02.2014 registered under Sections 304-B and 498-A of Indian Penal Code at Police Station Jandiala, District Amritsar.

2. Learned counsel appearing for the petitioner *inter alia* contends that FIR (supra) was filed on the statement of complainant. It is contended by learned counsel for the petitioners that petitioners had shifted their residence to a rental accommodation and therefore, the petitioners have not received any summons from the Court and neither Police has informed them about pendency of the FIR(supra). Moreover, the petitioners are illiterate persons, who do not know anything about the legal proceedings. It is further contended that the impugned order is liable to be set aside on the ground that the mandate of Section 82 (1) of Cr.P.C. has not been followed in its letter and spirit by the trial Court. It is also

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submitted that the petitioners undertake to appear before the trial Court on each and every date.

3. Per contra, learned State counsel supports the order passed by the learned trial Court by contending that the petitioner did not put in appearance before the trial Court intentionally and deliberately and, therefore, having left with no other option, proclamation was issued to secure their presence.

4. I have heard learned counsel for the parties and perused the record of the case with their able assistance and with the consent of parties, the matter is taken up for final disposal.

5. While the scheme of criminal justice system necessitates curtailment of personal liberty to some extent, it is of the utmost importance that the same is done in line with the procedure established by law to maintain a healthy balance between personal liberty of the individual-accused and interests of the society in promoting law and order. Such procedure must be compatible with Article 21 of the Constitution of India i.e. it must be fair, just and not suffer from the vice of arbitrariness or unreasonableness.

6. A perusal of the impugned order reveals that the trial Court issued proclamation without recording reasons of its belief that the petitioner has absconded or is concealing himself. This Court in the judgment passed in ***Major Singh @ Major Vs. State of Punjab 2023 (3) RCR (Criminal) 406; 2023 (2) Law Herald 1506*** has held that the Court is first required to record its satisfaction before issuance of process under Section 82 of Cr.P.C. and non- recording of the satisfaction itself makes such order suffering from incurable illegality. In the judgment passed by this Court in ***Sonu Vs. State of Haryana 2021 (1) RCR (Crl.) 319***, it has been held that the conditions specified in Section 82 (2) Cr.P.C.



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for the publication of a proclamation against an absconder are mandatory. Any non-compliance therewith cannot be cured as an 'irregularity' and renders the proclamation and proceedings subsequent thereto a nullity.

7. The sole purpose of issuance of non-bailable warrants or issuance of proclamation is to secure presence of the accused before the trial Court. The petitioners in the present case have themselves come forward and have undertaken to appear before the trial Court on each and every date.

8. In view of the aforesaid facts and circumstances, the present petition is allowed. The impugned order dated 07.12.2015 (Annexure P-3) vide which the petitioners were declared proclaimed offenders, is hereby set aside along with all consequential proceedings arising therefrom. The petitioners are directed to appear before the trial Court within four weeks and on their doing so, they shall be admitted to bail on their furnishing bail bonds and surety bonds to the satisfaction of the trial Court, along with costs of Rs. 20,000/- to be deposited with the *All India Pingalwara Charitable Society, G.T. Road, Amritsar*, for wasting precious time of the Court.
