SUMEET GOEL, J. (ORAL)

1. Present petition has been filed under Section 528 of Bharatiya
Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita, 2023, for quashing of FIR No.104 dated
01.10.2021, under Sections 323, 498-A and 406 IPC, registered at Women
Police Station, Gurgaon, District Gurugram, and all subsequent
proceedings arising therefrom, on the basis of compromise dated 8.7.2024
(Annexure P-1).

2 On 13.08.2024, the following order was passed:

*'The petitioners have approached this Court seeking quashing of FIR
(Annexure P-2) and all consequential proceedings emanating therefrom
on the basis of a compromise having been effected between the parties.*

Notice of motion.

*At this stage, Ms. Mahima Yashpal, DAG, Haryana has put in appearance
on behalf of respondent No 1 State of Haryana and accepts notice.*



Ms. Deepali Puri, Advocate has entered appearance on behalf of respondent No. 2.

The parties are directed to get their statements recorded qua the factum of compromise in the following manner:

(i) The petitioners shall appear before the trial Court/Illaq Magistrate concerned on 22.08.2024 or any date thereafter as fixed by trial Court/Illaq Magistrate for recording statement of the petitioners as well as of the complainant qua the factum of compromise. As and when any such appearance is made, the trial Court/Illaq Magistrate shall do the needful for recording the statements of the parties qua the factum of the compromise. It shall be open to the trial Court/Illaq Magistrate to either record the statement of the parties by physical process or by video conferencing as deemed appropriate by the trial Court/Illaq Magistrate.

(ii) In case the statement is to be recorded by way of video conferencing, the parties concerned shall be duly identified through video conferencing by their respective counsel, subject to the satisfaction of the Presiding Officer.

(iii) The trial Court/Illaq Magistrate may also choose to get the statements of the parties recorded through some Commissioner, appointed by the Court who would be some Advocate having sufficient standing at the Bar. In case the statement is recorded through some Commissioner, such Commissioner/Advocate shall furnish an affidavit after recording statements to the effect that the parties had appeared before him/her and he/she had recorded their statements as per law and that the said parties had been duly identified by their respective counsel. This shall be subject to satisfaction of trial Court/Illaq Magistrate.

After recording the statements of all the affected parties in either of the aforesaid manner, the trial Court/Illaq Magistrate shall submit its report on the basis of the statements so recorded as to whether all the affected parties have entered into a compromise and as to whether the compromise in question is found to be a valid compromise and has been effected without there being any kind of influence or coercion.

The trial Court/Illaq Magistrate shall also report as regards the following facts after seeking information from Investigating Officer, concerned:

(i) Whether there is any other accused other than the petitioners, arrayed in this petition.

(ii) Whether there is any other complainant or affected/aggrieved party other than the respondents, arrayed in the



petition.

(iii) Whether any accused has been declared Proclaimed Offender?

The report be submitted before this Court before the next date of hearing i.e. 12.09.2024.

3. Pursuant to the aforesaid order, report dated 23.08.2024 from Judicial Magistrate, Ist Class, Gurugram, has been received, which is taken on record. As per the report, the Trial Court has recorded as follows:-

5. I have also inquired from both the parties, especially from complainant Ms. Ritika Mehta who has stated that the compromise has been arrived between them voluntarily and the same is not due to any threat, coercion or undue influence from the accused side and is a volunteer act of the parties.

6. In the view of the statement of complainant Ritika Mehta qua compromise, I am of the considered view that the compromise effected between the parties appears to be without any threat or pressure from either side and is made out of free volition of the parties.

7. Requisite report on specific points as directed vide order dated 13.08.2024 is as follows:

(i) There are four accused arrayed in the present FIR namely Vipin (husband), Chanchal (mother-in-law), Yograj (father-in-law), Vishal (brother-in-law).

However, charge sheet is filed only against three accused i.e. Vipin, Yograj and Vishal.

(ii) The complainant in the present case is Ritika Mehta. She is the sole complainant in the present case and has made her statement in support of the compromise.

(iii) Accused persons have never been declared proclaimed offender in any case. Their version has been verified by IO concerned. Separate statement of the IO in this regard recorded.

4. Learned counsel for respondent No.2 admits the factum of parties having compromised and states that she has no objection in case the impugned order is quashed.



5. Similarly, learned State counsel has stated that he has no objection in case the impugned order is quashed as the parties have compromised the matter amicably.

6. I have heard learned counsel for the parties and have carefully gone through the records of the case.

7. This Court and Apex Court has repeatedly dealt with the issue of exercise of jurisdiction under Section 482 of the Code to quash proceeding in non-compoundable offences in the cases of ***Gian Singh vs. State of Punjab and another, 2012 (10) SCC 303, Kulwinder Singh & others vs. State of Punjab & another, 2007 (3) RCR (Criminal) 1052 and Ram Gopal and another vs. State of Madhya Pradesh, 2021 (4) R.C.R. (Criminal) 322 (Criminal Appeal No.1489 of 2012 decided on 29th of September, 2021)***. The proposition of law that emerges from the aforesaid decisions rendered by Apex Court and this Court is:

(a) Power u/s 482 Cr.P.C. vested with this Court is much wider and is unaffected by Section 320 of the Code.

(b) However, wider the power greater the caution.

(c) The underlining principle while exercising such power is that it can be invoked to quash the proceedings recognizing compromise between the parties in the matters which are overwhelmingly and predominantly of civil character like commercial transactions or arising out of matrimonial relationship or family disputes.

(d) The said power is not to be exercised in the prosecutions involving heinous and serious offences of mental depravity or offences like murder, rape, dacoity etc. as such offences are not private in nature and have a serious impact on society.

(e) Section 482 Cr.P.C. casts duty upon the High Court to advance interest of justice as well. It is in recognition of this duty casted upon the High Court, that Apex Court held that the High Court would not refuse to quash FIR under Section 307 merely because FIR finds mention thereof. High Court can assess nature of injuries sustained, whether such injuries



inflicted on vital/delicate parts of the body/nature of weapons used etc.

(f) Such exercise at the hands of High Court would be permissible only after the evidence is collected after investigation and charge-sheet is filed/ charges framed during the trial. Such exercise cannot be carried out while the matter is still under investigation.

(g) While quashing FIR in non-compoundable offences even which are private in nature, High Court is required to consider antecedents of the accused, conduct of the accused and whether he was absconding or whether he has managed the complainant to enter into a compromise.

8 Thus, keeping in view the aforesaid facts and circumstances, this Court is of the considered opinion that it is a fit case to exercise jurisdiction vested u/s 528 of BNSS to quash the FIR as :-

(i) Putting a quietus to the proceedings will bring peace and tranquility amongst parties & will accordingly further the cause of substantial justice.

(ii) The offences alleged are primarily of private nature.

(iii) The parties have compromised.

(iv) As per the report received the compromise is said to be voluntary in its nature.

(v) Complainant/victim is reported to have entered into compromise on his own volition.

9 Consequently, the petition is allowed. FIR No.104 dated 01.10.2021, under Sections 323, 498-A and 406 IPC, registered at Women Police Station, Gurgaon, District Gurugram, and all subsequent proceedings arising therefrom, on the basis of compromise dated 8.7.2024, is, hereby, quashed qua the petitioners.
