ORDER

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22.09.2025

1. The present petition is filed seeking quashing of FIR No. 179/2019 dated 20.09.2019, registered at Police Station DBG Road, for offences under Sections 287/338 of the Indian Penal Code, 1860 ('**IPC**'), on the ground that the complainant does not wish to pursue any proceedings arising out of the present FIR.
2. The brief facts are that Respondent No.2 is an employee of the petitioner. Respondent No.2 allegedly suffered an accident from a stone cutting machine during the course of his employment with the petitioner, which led to both of his legs being amputated.
3. The present petition is filed on the ground that the matter has been amicably settled between the parties by way of a Memorandum of Understanding / Settlement Deed dated 17.04.2025, out of their own free will, without any force, pressure, coercion, threat or undue influence.

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4. Respondent No. 2 is present in Court and states that he has received a sum of ₹1,50,000/- as compensation (out of which ₹1,00,000/- was handed over to the complainant on 06.08.2025 by way of Cheque bearing no. 368481 dated 06.08.2025 drawn on Federal Bank) and he is also currently employed with the petitioner.

5. The chargesheet indicates that the leg of the complainant was amputated during the accident.

6. The disability certificate indicates that the complainant in the accident suffered permanent disability to the extent of 45%. The complainant, however, states that he will be satisfied if some more compensation is provided to him.

7. Learned counsel for the petitioner, on instructions, states that in addition to the sum already paid, an additional sum of ₹5,00,000/- will be paid as a compensation. He also on behalf of the petitioner undertakes that the complainant will be kept in employment with the petitioner at least for a period of two more years subject to him performing his duties. He, however, requests that some time may be granted for payment of the said amount.

8. Complainant, as noted, states that he is satisfied with the amount and since he has also been working with the petitioner, he has no remaining grievance. He also states that his foot was properly operated pursuant to the accident. He is not facing much difficulty as of today.

9. The parties are present in person in Court and have been duly identified by the Investigating Officer.

10. On being asked, Respondent No.2 states that he does not wish to pursue any proceedings arising out of the present FIR and



he has no objection if the same are quashed. He further states that he is satisfied with the compensation amount.

11. Offence under Section 338 of the IPC is compoundable, whereas offence under Section 287 is non- compoundable.

12. It is well settled that the High Court while exercising its powers under Section 528 of the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita, 2023 ('BNSS') (erstwhile Section 482 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1973) can quash offences which are non-compoundable on the ground that there is a compromise between the accused and the complainant. The Hon'ble Apex Court has laid down parameters and guidelines for High Court while accepting settlement and quashing the proceedings. In the case of **Narinder Singh & Ors. v. State of Punjab & Anr. : (2014) 6 SCC 466**, the Hon'ble Supreme Court had observed as under :-

"29. In view of the aforesaid discussion, we sum up and lay down the following principles by which the High Court would be guided in giving adequate treatment to the settlement between the parties and exercising its power under Section 482 of the Code while accepting the settlement and quashing the proceedings or refusing to accept the settlement with direction to continue with the criminal proceedings:

29.1. Power conferred under Section 482 of the Code is to be distinguished from the power which lies in the Court to compound the offences under Section 320 of the Code. No doubt, under Section 482 of the Code, the High Court has inherent power to quash the criminal proceedings even in those cases which are not compoundable, where the parties have settled the matter between themselves. However, this power is to be exercised sparingly and with caution.

29.2. When the parties have reached the settlement and on that basis petition for quashing the criminal proceedings is filed, the guiding factor in such cases would be to secure:

(i) ends of justice, or

(ii) to prevent abuse of the process of any court.



While exercising the power the High Court is to form an opinion on either of the aforesaid two objectives.

29.3. Such a power is not to be exercised in those prosecutions which involve heinous and serious offences of mental depravity or offences like murder, rape, dacoity, etc. Such offences are not private in nature and have a serious impact on society. Similarly, for the offences alleged to have been committed under special statute like the Prevention of Corruption Act or the offences committed by public servants while working in that capacity are not to be quashed merely on the basis of compromise between the victim and the offender.

29.4. On the other hand, those criminal cases having overwhelmingly and predominantly civil character, particularly those arising out of commercial transactions or arising out of matrimonial relationship or family disputes should be quashed when the parties have resolved their entire disputes among themselves.

29.5. While exercising its powers, the High Court is to examine as to whether the possibility of conviction is remote and bleak and continuation of criminal cases would put the accused to great oppression and prejudice and extreme injustice would be caused to him by not quashing the criminal cases.”

(emphasis supplied)

13. Similarly, in the case of ***Parbatbhai Aahir & Ors. v. State of Gujarat & Anr. : (2017) 9 SCC 641***, the Hon’ble Supreme Court had observed as under :-

“16. The broad principles which emerge from the precedents on the subject, may be summarised in the following propositions:

16.1. Section 482 preserves the inherent powers of the High Court to prevent an abuse of the process of any court or to secure the ends of justice. The provision does not confer new powers. It only recognises and preserves powers which inhere in the High Court.

16.2. The invocation of the jurisdiction of the High



Court to quash a first information report or a criminal proceeding on the ground that a settlement has been arrived at between the offender and the victim is not the same as the invocation of jurisdiction for the purpose of compounding an offence. While compounding an offence, the power of the court is governed by the provisions of Section 320 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1973. The power to quash under Section 482 is attracted even if the offence is non-compoundable.

16.3. In forming an opinion whether a criminal proceeding or complaint should be quashed in exercise of its jurisdiction under Section 482, the High Court must evaluate whether the ends of justice would justify the exercise of the inherent power.

16.4. While the inherent power of the High Court has a wide ambit and plenitude it has to be exercised (i) to secure the ends of justice, or (ii) to prevent an abuse of the process of any court.

16.5. The decision as to whether a complaint or first information report should be quashed on the ground that the offender and victim have settled the dispute, revolves ultimately on the facts and circumstances of each case and no exhaustive elaboration of principles can be formulated.

16.6. In the exercise of the power under Section 482 and while dealing with a plea that the dispute has been settled, the High Court must have due regard to the nature and gravity of the offence. **Heinous and serious offences involving mental depravity or offences such as murder, rape and dacoity cannot appropriately be quashed though the victim or the family of the victim have settled the dispute. Such offences are, truly speaking, not private in nature but have a serious impact upon society. The decision to continue with the trial in such cases is founded on the overriding element of public interest in punishing persons for serious offences.**

16.7. As distinguished from serious offences, there may be criminal cases which have an overwhelming or predominant element of a civil dispute. They stand on a distinct footing insofar as the exercise of the inherent power to quash is concerned.

16.8. Criminal cases involving offences which arise from commercial, financial, mercantile, partnership



or similar transactions with an essentially civil flavour may in appropriate situations fall for quashing where parties have settled the dispute.

16.9. In such a case, the High Court may quash the criminal proceeding if in view of the compromise between the disputants, the possibility of a conviction is remote and the continuation of a criminal proceeding would cause oppression and prejudice; and

16.10. There is yet an exception to the principle set out in propositions 16.8. and 16.9. above. Economic offences involving the financial and economic well-being of the State have implications which lie beyond the domain of a mere dispute between private disputants. The High Court would be justified in declining to quash where the offender is involved in an activity akin to a financial or economic fraud or misdemeanour. The consequences of the act complained of upon the financial or economic system will weigh in the balance.”

(emphasis supplied)

14. From the perusal of FIR, the alleged incident appears to be a case of accident. It is not alleged that the petitioner had been negligent in maintaining the machinery or that such accidents occurred on a regular basis. Given the fact that the dispute has been settled between the parties and the complainant is satisfied with the compensation amount, this Court is of the opinion that no purpose would be served by keeping the dispute alive.

15. Keeping in view the aforesaid principle and the nature of dispute and the fact that the parties have amicably entered into a settlement, this Court feels that this is a fit case for exercising the discretionary jurisdiction under Section 528 of the BNSS.

16. In view of the above, FIR No.179/2019 and all consequential proceedings arising therefrom are quashed, subject to the petitioner paying the amount of ₹5,00,000/- in 10 monthly instalments of ₹50,000/- each to Respondent No.2.

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17. Proofs of payment be submitted with the concerned Investigating Officer/ SHO.

18. The present petition is disposed of in the aforesaid terms. Pending application(s) also stand disposed of.
